FIRE DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS

Fire Department Operations

- Fire is a chaotic event
- All fire incidents have a list of priorities that is followed
 - Life Safety
 - Incident Stabilization



Property Conservation

- Salvage Operations
 - Moving and/or covering items
 - Fans to exhaust smoke from the area once the fire is controlled
 - Preventing water damage
 - Turning off valves
 - Stopping unnecessary waterflow from hose lines
 - Water chutes






Overhaul

- Searching for hidden fire and rendering the building safe
- Returning the building to as close to normal as possible
- Recognizing and preserving evidence




Fire Investigation

- Cause and origin will be examined in all fires
- Fires determined suspicious will be investigated further
- Fires with civilian or firefighter fatalities will undergo a higher level of scrutiny
- The owner's insurance carrier may limit access to the building until they investigate



Building Relationships



Conversation Starters

- Who you are, who you serve, and why you are important to the community
- What you have and why it is important to the community
- What are your collection priorities, and why

Who are your visitors and how they could be at risk during a

fire




Building the Relationship

- Include your fire department in your disaster planning process from the very beginning.
- Invite your first responders (and their families) to visit your institution as your special guests.
- Are there volunteer opportunities with the fire department or can you play host for one of their events?




What to Share

- Floor maps
- Accurate building/room names
- Formal blueprints
- Knox box location (and make sure the most current key is in there)
- Hazards in the building or collection
- Location of key box for interior keys



Disaster Team Roles

- Ensure you have a Liaison Officer
- A brief ICS digression:



During the Fire

- Be prepared to have your Liaison Officer tell the fire department's liaison:
 - Who is in the building (and where they are, if you know)
 - Do any of them have special needs?
 - What hazards are present and where they are
 - Your priority collections/exhibits are and where they are

NOTE:


 Once the fire department arrives on site, they are in control of your building until they return it to you.

What are the next steps?

- If you haven't already, start planning
- Keep on learning!
 - Take ICS or CERT training
- Go meet your first responders
